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School Bus Driver, 61, Held After 5 Children Die in Crossing Crash

FARMVILLE, Va., Mar. 14.—A 61-year-old school bus driver has been charged with involuntary manslaughter following the collision of his vehicle and a passenger train. Five children were killed and 10 were hurt.

John Oscar Robinson, colored, will face a preliminary hearing on March 27 in Prince Edward County Trial Justice Court. State police say ne was the driver of the school bus which was struck late yesterday about 14 miles west of here of here.

The rear of the bus, loaded with 45 colored students, was ripped open as an eastbound Norfolk & Western train plowed into it. Dead and injured children were scattered along the tracks.

One-fourth of the bus was sheared off and shattered into

Mr. Robinson told State Police Sergt. L. Stanley he did not see or hear the train and had started across the tracks when he felt the collision about 4 p.m.
