TO: All Teachers and Principals SUBJECT: Work of Visiting Teacher

How Can The Visiting Teacher Help You?

As you begin your work of the year, you will be thinking about resources that will help you with children who have problems. The Visiting Teacher is a resource person who may be able to help you.

The Visiting Teacher is a member of the school staff. She works with the school, the home and the community and the community agencies in making adjustments for and with the child who is having unusual difficulty in profiting from school experience or who is showing early symptoms of any maladjustment. The work of the Visiting Teacher differs from that of an attendance officer both in nature and purpose.

The types of problems that should be referred to the Visiting Teacher are:

- a. The child who does not enroll in school.
- b. The child who enrolls, but who is irregular in attendance.
- c. The child who is too aggressive and belligerent to work harmoniously with other children and the teacher.
- d. The child who is too shy and withdrawn to participate successfully in group activities.
- e. The child who suffers from a physical, mental or emotional condition which affects his participation in school life.

How To Make A Referral

If you feel that a child needs help, talk the problem over first with your principal. He has a supply of referral forms. If you and he agree that a referral should be made after you have made proper contact with the home, fill in the form giving all information pertinent to the problem. Then give the referral to the principal who will refer the case to the Visiting Teacher if it seems advisable. It is urgently recommended that all referrals, particularly the emotionally disturbed child be brought to the attention of the Visiting Teacher as soon as discovered. It is an indication of understanding to make a good referral early, and it is a credit to a teacher to make a good referral.

I am asking that requests for excusing children from further school attendance be made through the Visiting Teacher.
