

MORE ABOUT THE INSTITUTE

Longwood College, with its friendly and welcoming atmosphere, will be fondly remembered by the 59 school and administrative office secretaries, clerks of boards and employees of the State Department of Education who attended the Institute. Better State coverage couldn't have been hoped for, with people coming from Bristol, others from the Alexandria-Fairfax area, and still others from Norfolk, with many of the cities and counties in between being well represented.

Dr. M. L. Landrum, Head of the Department of Business Education at Longwood, and his associates presented a stimulating and helpful curriculum. From the very first to the last moment the program was a good investment of the secretaries time.

Mr. Stuart Beville, Principal of Farmville High School, in his discussion of "What Makes a Good Secretary" unexpectedly turned the spotlight on the school principal. We realized with a new emphasis that the successful school principal is helped to do his best work when he has a secretary who is constantly on the alert to improve her situation, who believes that people, especially children and youth, are important.

In the panel discussion led by Longwood seniors, the secretaries were given the latest slant on correct office procedures. We learned that good manners in the office include keeping one's point of view on work - not on personal reactions.

During group discussions (the time to let our hair down), it was recognized that the secretary's situation could be improved if the following questions could be answered:

- 1. How can we carry out certain responsibilities without authority?
- 2. How can we bring about better orientation of school personnel in the compiling of state reports?
- 3. How can we make school personnel more aware of meeting DEADLINES in reports, etc?
- 4. Could some of the administrative secretary's 'headaches' be assumed by the school secretaries?
- 5. Is there a way out for the clerically understaffed school board offices? (Even a part-time worker would be a "gift from above" in the majority of cases.)
- 6. Could a committee of secretaries, principals and administrative officials compile a handbook setting forth the policies of the division?
