Fire Destroys Lincoln High School Building

The main building of the Lincoln high school was completely destroyed by fire of unknown origin Thursday night. The alarm was given by a colored man passing through the town about midnight. Mr. Sanders, the school principal, was the first townsman to reach the scene of the fire. He found a large part of the basement and halls in flames.

The fire spread rapidly and before help came it was beyond control. With the assistance of the voluntary fire company from Purcellville, the manual training shop nearby was saved. The new home economics cottage was never in danger.

The destroyed building was constructed in 1909 entirely by private subscription at a cost of approximately \$12,500. It was one of the first rural high school buildings in Northern Virginia. and for a number of years was a model for such structures in the

The building was insured for \$20,000, which will be used in rebuliding as soon as a location is selected by the school board. #### THE NEW HIGH SCHOOL BUILDING

Where should the Lincoln high school building be rebuilt? That is the question that is uppermost in the minds of a large number of citizens of this and the surrounding communities. The law fixes that responsibility, however, on the school board, but the task will be much easier to perform if the board is supported by public sen-

Considerable can be said in favor of rebuilding on the old site. The manuel training shop, the home economics cottage and the school grounds, representing an investment of approximately \$6. 000, would have to be disposed of if the building were erected elsewhere. For sixty years or more Lincoln has been an educational center for this section of the county. One of the best schools of Northern Virginia at the time was the one operated by Samuel N. Janney at Lincoln. Many young men and women, not only from this State, but from neighboring states, were prepared there for college. About twenty years ago began the movement which resulted in 1909 in the erection of the building which was destroyed by fire last Thursday night.

The citizens of the Lincoln community have loyally supported elect to the United States conthe school in every way possible. They raised the money necessary to purchase the site and erect the building. Since then the community league has raised funds to match those supplied by the State for the erection of the manual training shop and home economics cottage. At the time of the erection of the high school building there hibitory laws against unclean was not much difference in the size of the elementary schools at milk and give the sellers and Lincoln and Purcellville, but the people of Lincoln raised the necessary funds for the building which the people of Purcellville were unable to do, so the building was located at Lincoln. Since that time, however, Purcellville has doubled in size and the problem of transporting the constantly increasing number of pupils to and from school has not been an easy or inexpensive one for the school board to solve. Judging from the rate at which the town is growing and the number of pupils now enrolled in the graded school here, the problem of transportation promises to become increasingly serious and expensive. It would seem well worth while, therefore, for the school board to consider the advisability of moving the high school near enough to be within walking distance of Purcellville, which would also shorten the distance for the Hamilton and Hillsboro pupils to travel.

Like most problems, this one has two sides. 
#### Town Census Completed.



An appeal was then taken to the Circuit Court and heard by Judge Fletcher on Friday, June 18. He dismissed the appeal and remanded the case to the county school trustee electoral board to be heard on its merits.


